News from GuIT, by Maurizio Himmelmann

GuIT was born in 2000 as a small website with only a bit of information for L_AT_EX beginners, and a discussion forum for those who needed urgent help. We chose a forum instead of a mailing list so that all discussions would be in the public domain. This seems to have been a good choice because, after a while, it caught on and an increasing number of people have been using the forum as a “virtual meeting point” to solve one another's problems, or in general to share knowledge about the main topics (T_EX, L_AT_EX, ConT_EXt, related programs and typographical problems).

In 2003 we began to work hard to rebuild the entire website, putting more and more information up and improving the forum's performance. Our target was to propose GuIT as the main L_AT_EX resource on the Italian scene. That same year, we asked (and obtained) permission to become an official user group.

However, some other problems had arisen: once GuIT was formed, all the work was being done by only six people — we needed to involve other people and share the work load with them. In the beginning we tried to set up a kind of free partnership, where anyone was free to give his/her contribution, but in spite of the big number of so-called “members”, none seemed willing to participate actively. In addition, we needed some funds in order to expand the activity. The “all free” strategy was no longer viable; we opted for a “low cost” membership.

In October 2004, GuIT organized the first Italian LaTeX conference, called GuIT-meeting. With only a limited budget, thanks to the great help received from the Scuola Superiore Sant’Anna, we succeeded in involving more than 70 people, who came from every corner of Italy: it was a success beyond our most optimistic forecasts.¹

As we strongly believe that “Sharing knowledge means increasing knowledge”, we are now working hard to organize an even bigger and better meeting on October 22, trying to do our best to spread and support L^AT_EX knowledge throughout Italy. TUG 2005 election — results and record, from Barbara Beeton

Karl Berry has been elected president for the term that ends with the 2007 annual meeting.

The following votes were counted:

183 for Karl Berry 177 for Lance Carnes

Both candidates made a good showing, although the total number of voters was only a third of those eligible.

Of 1,080 members as of the ballot closing date (May 17), 360 valid ballots were received. Ten ballots postmarked after the closing date, and three received with no return address, were not opened or counted.²

As previously announced, the number of candidates for open board positions was fewer than positions, so these board candidates were declared duly elected for a term ending with the 2009 annual meeting:

Gerree Pecht has been reappointed, and Lance Carnes was also appointed; terms for both end in 2007.

This was the first contested election since 1991. Thanks to everyone for their participation.

On 16 June, a one-hour Member Meeting was held, Robin Laakso of the TUG Office has provided the following summary.

About 25–30 people attended. Karl Berry opened the meeting by thanking everyone for attending, including a special thanks to Lance Carnes for running for President this year, and for his valuable input on membership ideas. Robin Laakso provided a quick overview of TUG’s financial statements, member statistics and TUGboat production. Discussion about how to increase TUG membership and change member benefits (among other topics) followed. Here are some discussion highlights/suggestions:

- Add a member-only support mailing list. If you’re a TUG member you’d be given an option to subscribe to the tech support list. Your question would be answered by a volunteer support crew, and possibly read by members (this part hasn’t been decided yet).
- Write a “ \TeX for Dummies” book or, by whatever name, a more practical kind of book, along the lines of “ \TeX by Example” or “Practical \TeX Step by Step”.
- Ask \TeX developers to add a promotional line at the end of their email, such as, “Please support your local \TeX Users Group”.
- Design posters about \TeX /TUG — make them freely available to graduate and undergraduate departments and at cost to individuals.
- Re-print and/or re-design \TeX t-shirts: “Practice Safe \TeX ”, “You can’t do that in horizontal mode”.
- Encourage small local users groups on campuses, institutions, localities.
- Hold conferences at a university and allow students to attend free of charge.
- Investigate holding a conference where and when the JMM or another math conference is held.

New TUGboat posting policies

Effective with the first issue of volume 26 (2005), *TUGboat* will be available on-line to members immediately upon print publication. On-line publication to non-members may be delayed up to one year after an issue’s print publication, to give members the benefit of early access. The mechanism has not yet been implemented, but will be in place by the time the first issue of volume 26 is distributed, and members will be notified in due course. T_EX Collection/T_EX Live

The T_EX Live group is aiming for an October 1st distribution date for the next iteration of the T_EX Collection, most likely to include T_EX Live, proT_EXt, and a CTAN snapshot, like last year.
